

***NEW FIRE,
VIGIL AND THE
FIRST EUCHARIST OF
EASTER***

*Christ our Passover has been sacrificed for us;
therefore let us keep the feast.*

The Lord is risen indeed, alleluia! 1 Corinthians 5.7–8

The Great Vigil consists of four parts:

A Service of Light

The service begins in the darkness of night. We kindle a new fire to drive away the darkness and from the fire we light a large candle, called the Paschal Candle. The Paschal Candle signifies the pillar of fire in the Old Testament which led the procession of the Old Israel through the wilderness, but which is now fulfilled in Christ, who is himself our guide and Light of the World. Through the use of fire, candles, words, movement, and music, the worshiping community becomes the pilgrim people of God following the “pillar of fire” given to us in Jesus Christ, the light shining in the darkness. The paschal candle is used throughout the service as a symbol for Jesus Christ.

As the Paschal Candle is carried into the church the deacon sings, ‘The light of Christ,’ and we respond, ‘Thanks be to God.’ From that candle the church is filled with light. Then a cantor sings the ancient hymn known as the Exsultet, which praises God for this night in which the people of Israel were delivered from Egypt, in which Christ rose from the dead, and in which we are baptised into his death and resurrection.

Ministry of the Word

The second part of the vigil consists of a series of readings from the Old and New Testaments. These lessons provide a panoramic view of what God has done for humanity. We are reminded of our delivery from bondage in the exodus, of God’s calling us to faithfulness through the cry of the prophets, of God dwelling among us in Jesus Christ, and of Christ’s rising in victory from the tomb. The readings thus retell our “holy history” as God’s children, summarising the faith into which we are baptised, and reaffirming our identity as the People of God, the Body of Christ.

Renewal of Baptism Promises

This part of the liturgy is celebrated at the font. In the earliest years of the Christian church, baptisms commonly took place at the vigil. So this vigil includes baptism and/or the renewal of the baptismal covenant. As with the natural symbol of light, water plays a critical role in the vigil. The image of water giving life, nurturing crops, sustaining life, and cleansing our bodies—cannot be missed in this part of the vigil. Nor is the ability of water to inflict death in drowning overlooked. Water brings both life and death. So also there is death and life in Baptism, for in Baptism we die to sin and are raised to life. Baptism unites believers to Christ’s death and resurrection.

Celebration of the Easter Eucharist

The vigil climaxes in a joyous celebration of the feast of the people of God. The risen Lord invites all to participate in the new life he brings by sharing the feast which he has prepared. We thus look forward to the great Messianic feast of the kingdom of God when the redeemed from every time and place “will come from east and west, and from north and south, and sit at table in the kingdom of God” (Luke 13:29). This is the Eucharist of the year, the one of which all our other Eucharists are repetitions. In sign and sacrament, holy story and song, the dying and rising of Jesus in the midst of the people is once again enacted. Sharing in the holy Gifts of the altar we find ourselves made one with Christ and rejoice in this foretaste of the glory of God’s kingdom, celebrating what God has done, is doing, and will do.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

THE SERVICE OF LIGHT

In darkness, fire is kindled.

Dear friends in Christ, on this most holy night, when our Lord Jesus Christ passed from death to life, the Church invites believers throughout the world to come together in vigil and prayer.

This is the Passover of the Lamb, Jesus Christ.

We remember his death and celebrate His resurrection confident that we shall share his victory and live with him for ever in God.

THE BLESSING OF THE NEW FIRE

Lord of all creation,
we thank you for the gift of fire
in which you revealed your name to Moses,
answered the prayer of Elijah,
and came upon your church at Pentecost:

Bless this new fire to be for us a sign of your presence,
that, set aflame with the fire of your love,
we may come to the feast of everlasting
light, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Taking the Paschal candle, Fr. Anthony traces a cross on it and marks the Greek letters Alpha and Omega and the four numbers of the current year, symbolising Christ's Lordship of all the ages, saying:

Christ yesterday and today, the Beginning and the End, Alpha and Omega;
all time belongs to him and all the ages.

To him be glory and power through every age and for ever. **Amen.**

Placing five nails at the extremities and centre of the cross, representing the "five wounds" of Christ, Fr. Anthony says:

By his holy and glorious wounds, may Christ the Lord guard us and keep us.
Amen.

The Paschal candle is lit from the new fire and Fr. Anthony says

May the light of Christ, rising in glory,
dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.

The Paschal candle is lifted high

The light of Christ.

Thanks be to God.

Everyone's candles are lit. The Paschal candle is carried into the church building, and we follow. Each time the procession pauses, the minister sings:

The light of Christ.

Thanks be to God.

The Exsultet – This congregational version of the long and glorious ancient proclamation, uses every image and symbol imaginable to speak of the reality of the redemption, freedom, light, deliverance and joy.

We sing together:

**Sing choirs of heaven! Let saints and angels sing!
Around God's throne exult in harmony!
Now Jesus Christ is risen from the grave!
Salute your king in glorious symphony!**

**Sing choirs of earth! Behold your light has come!
The glory of the Lord shines radiantly!
Lift up your hearts, for Christ has conquered death!
The night is past; the day of light is here!**

**Sing Church of God! Exalt with joy outpoured!
The gospel trumpets tell of victory won!
Your Saviour lives: he's with you evermore!
Let all God's people shout the loud Amen!**

The Lord be with you
and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.
We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
It is right to give our thanks and praise.

For this is the Passover feast when Christ the true Lamb of God is slain,
whose blood consecrates the homes of all the faithful.
Glory to you for ever.

This is the night when you first saved our ancestors,
freeing Israel from her slavery, and leading her safely through the sea.
Glory to you for ever.

This is the night when Jesus Christ vanquished hell,
broke the chains of death and rose triumphant from the grave.
Glory to you for ever.

This is the night when all who believe in him are freed from sin,
restored to grace and holiness, and share the victory of Christ.
Glory to you for ever.

This is the night that gave us back what we had lost;
beyond our deepest dreams you made even our sin a happy fault.
Glory to you for ever.

Most blessed of all nights,
Evil and hatred are put to flight and sin is washed away,
Lost innocence regained, and mourning turned to joy.
Glory to you for ever.

Night truly blessed when hatred is cast out,
peace and justice find a home, and heaven is joined to earth,
and all creation reconciled to you.
Glory to you for ever.

Therefore, heavenly Father, in this our Easter joy,
accept our sacrifice of praise, your Church's solemn offering
Grant that this Easter candle may make our darkness light.

The ministry of the Word:

The reading: Romans 6. 3-11

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

The Sermon

Renewal of Baptismal Vows: Please stand.

And now we give you thanks that we are made one with Christ in his death and resurrection.

Pour out your blessing + upon this water that it may be a sign of our dying and rising to new life with you, Christ our Lord.

May we live in your power, faithful to our calling, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. **Amen.**

Dear friends, through the paschal mystery we have been buried with Christ in his baptism, so that we may rise with him to new life.

Now that our Lenten observance is ended,
Let us each affirm the promises we made in baptism.

Do you turn to Christ?

We turn to Christ.

Do you repent of your sins?

We repent of our sins.

Do you reject selfish living, and all that is false and unjust?

We reject them all.

Do you renounce Satan and that is evil?

We renounce all that is evil.

I ask you now to make the profession of Christian faith into which you were baptised and in which you live and grow.

Do you believe in God the Father?
